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Course Description

You already own at least one great camera, whether it's a DSLR, smartphone, GoPro, or even a drone, but you may be wondering why it takes such ordinary photos. In this class, we will unlock the potential of the gear you already have and transform those ordinary photos into extraordinary visual tools for instruction.

Photography is a powerful medium that can significantly enhance your teaching by making abstract concepts tangible and engaging. We'll explore practical techniques to improve your photos, from mastering basic camera settings to understanding composition and lighting. Additionally, you'll learn how to use user-friendly editing software to refine and enhance your images, ensuring they capture your students' attention and imagination.

Beyond technical skills, we'll discuss creative strategies for integrating photography into your lesson plans across various subjects, fostering a more interactive and stimulating learning environment. By the end of this course, you'll be equipped to create compelling visual content that enhances your teaching and inspires your students.

Recommended Text, Software, Hardware and Course Materials

Guidebooks and Readings: <u>Digital Photography Complete Course</u> by DK. Publisher: Penguin Random House, ISBN–978-1-4654-3607-8. This is an excellent resource, but you may find the instructor-created materials along with Internet resources work as well, so it is not required for this course.

Software: A popular image editor is Adobe Lightroom which many districts subscribe to as part of Adobe's Creative Suite. Affinity Photo 2 is an excellent editor and if you have a free Canva EDU account, Affinity Photo 2 is free for you as well. Adobe Camera RAW, included in Photoshop is fine too. Canon, Nikon and GoPro cameras also include free RAW photo editing software.

Hardware: Today's cameras are very capable, and we'll endeavor to get the most out of the

camera(s) you already own. A DSLR, iPhone, GoPro and even drone camera will most likely be able to capture images in RAW format and be suitable for this class.

Online Resources: Relevant online resources that support the course content and encourage further investigation will be available throughout the course assignments. Active hyperlinks are utilized throughout the course and will link to the appropriate information when clicked. These include videos, podcasts, worksheets, online activities, journal articles and other resources.

Canvas: This course will be delivered totally online. Canvas is a web-based learning management system (LMS) that provides students access to online resources, documents, videos, assignments, quizzes, forums, etc. Canvas is easy to learn and has a user-friendly interface.

Course Dates

Self-paced; students may enroll at any time and take up to one year, from the date of registration, to complete assignments. Students may complete assignments in no less than three weeks for a 3-unit course (one week per unit).

Writing Requirements

- **Superior:** Writing is clear, succinct, and reflects graduate level expectations. Clearly addresses all parts of the writing task. Maintains a consistent point of view and organizational structure. Include relevant facts, details, and explanations.
- **Standard:** Writing is acceptable with very few mistakes in grammar and spelling. Addresses most parts of the writing task. Maintains a mostly consistent point of view and organizational structure. Include mostly relevant facts, details, and explanations.
- **Sub-standard:** Writing contains noticeable mistakes in grammar and spelling. Does not address all parts of the writing task. Lacks a consistent point of view and organization structure. May include marginally relevant facts, details, and explanations.

Lesson Plan Requirements

- **Superior:** Instructional goals and objectives clearly stated. Instructional strategies appropriate for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is clearly delineated and authentic. All materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson clearly listed.
- Standard: Instructional goals and objectives are stated but are not easy to understand. Some instructional strategies are appropriate for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is present. Most materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are listed.
- Sub-standard: Instructional goals and objectives are not stated. Learners cannot tell what is
 expected of them. Instructional strategies are missing or strategies used are inappropriate.
 Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is missing. Materials
 necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are missing.

Discussion Forum Requirements

• **Superior:** Response was at least 1 page (3 fully developed paragraphs) in length. Thoroughly answered all the posed questions, followed all the assignment directions, proper grammar and no spelling errors. Language is clear, concise, and easy to understand. Uses terminology appropriately and is logically organized.

- **Standard:** Response was ½ to 1 page in length (2-3 fully developed paragraphs). Answered all the questions but did not provide an in-depth analysis, followed most of the assignment directions, proper grammar and no spelling errors. Language is comprehensible, but there a few passages that are difficult to understand. The organization is generally good.
- **Sub-standard:** Response was less than ½ page in length (1 paragraph). Did not answer all the required questions and/or statements or responses were superficial, vague, or unclear, did not follow the assignment directions, many grammar and spelling errors. Is adequately written, but may use some terms incorrectly; may need to be read two or more times to be understood.

Instructor/Student Contact Information

Throughout the course participants will be communicating with the instructor and their classmates on a regular basis using asynchronous discussion forums. A virtual office is utilized for class questions and students are provided with instructor contact information in the event they want to make email or phone contact. In addition, students are encouraged to email or phone the instructor at any time. Students will also receive feedback on the required assignments as they are submitted.

Discussion Forums

Participation is an important expectation of this course and all online courses. Online discussions promote reflection and analysis while allowing students to appreciate and evaluate positions that others express. While students may not be engaging with the same students throughout this course they will be expected to offer comments, questions, and replies to the discussion question whenever possible. The faculty role in the discussion forum is that of an observer and facilitator.

Coursework Hours

Based on the Carnegie Unit standard, a unit of graduate credit measures academic credit based on the number of hours the student is engaged in learning. This includes all time spent on the course: reading the textbook, watching videos, listening to audio lessons, researching topics, writing papers, creating projects, developing lesson plans, posting to discussion boards, etc. Coursework offered for FPU Continuing Education graduate credit adheres to 45 hours per semester unit for the 900-level courses. Therefore, a student will spend approximately 135 hours on a typical 3-unit course.
