Course Description

Wonderful short stories have sprung from many cultures and traditions, and from countries throughout the world. When one reads international authors, one is caught first by the universality of life. Their concerns and experiences and dilemmas are not that different from those of readers and writers everywhere.

At the same time, reading international short stories quickens our awareness of the way place and time contribute unique dimensions to the universal experiences of life. We gain intimate information about cultural and social perspectives. We're invited to "share the skin" of characters whose experiences may be very different from ours. We are invited to see political positions from a new angle, and we often witness history in the making.

Teachers will be asked to reflect on the 10 stories they read by writing brief informal responses and will have an opportunity to experiment with ways to incorporate two of these stories into their teaching.

This course is designed to meet the objectives identified in the Common Core State Standards in Language Arts, the National Council of Teachers of English Standards, as well as the five core propositions of the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. These national standards undergird the activities of the course. Students will be asked to make connections between their work and these standards or the standards of their own states.

Note: Required book must be acquired separately.

Required Texts and Course Materials

Book: Fiction 100: An Anthology of Short Fiction, by James H. Pickering. Prentice-Hall, 2012 (13th edition).

Shrink-wrapped with the text is a helpful "Reader's Guide to the Short Story" that reviews the elements of fiction, identifies resources for researching and writing about the short story, and provides historical context for the reading. The publisher maintains a companion web site that offers additional resources. Earlier editions of *Fiction 100* may be used.

Note: Students are responsible for purchasing their own textbook, analyzing the content, and applying what they learned to the course assignments. You can order the book directly from the publisher or from one of several discount aggregators.

Canvas: This course will be delivered totally online. Canvas is a web-based learning management system (LMS) that provides students access to online resources, documents, videos, assignments, quizzes, forums, etc. Canvas is easy to learn and has a user-friendly interface.

Online Resources: Relevant online resources that support the course content and encourage further investigation will be available throughout the course assignments. Active hyperlinks are utilized throughout the course and will link to the appropriate information when clicked. These include videos, podcasts, worksheets, online activities, journal articles and other resources.

Course Dates

Self-paced; students may enroll at any time and take up to one year, from the date of registration, to complete assignments. Students may complete assignments in no less than three weeks for a 3-unit course (one week per unit).

Grading Policies

- Assignments will be graded per criteria presented in the course rubrics.
- A = 90-100% and B = 80-89%, (anything below 80% will not receive credit.)
- The discernment between an A or a B letter grade is at the discretion of the instructor based on the quality of work submitted (see course rubrics).
- Coursework falling below a B grade will be returned with further instructions.
- All assignments must be completed to receive a grade and are expected to reflect the quality that teacher-training institutions require of professional educators. If completed assignments do not meet this standard, students will be notified with further instructions from the instructor.

Writing Requirements

- **Standard:** Writing is acceptable with very few mistakes in grammar and spelling. Addresses most parts of the writing task. Maintains a mostly consistent point of view and organizational structure. Includes mostly relevant facts, details, and explanations.
- **Sub-standard:** Writing contains noticeable mistakes in grammar and spelling. Does not address all parts of the writing task. Lacks a consistent point of view and organizational structure. May include marginally relevant facts, details, and explanations.

- Superior: Instructional goals and objectives clearly stated. Instructional strategies appropriate
 for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is
 clearly delineated and authentic. All materials necessary for student and teacher to complete
 lesson clearly listed.
- Standard: Instructional goals and objectives are stated but are not easy to understand. Some instructional strategies are appropriate for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is present. Most materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are listed.
- **Sub-standard:** Instructional goals and objectives are not stated. Learners cannot tell what is expected of them. Instructional strategies are missing or strategies used are inappropriate. Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is missing. Materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are missing.

Instructor/Student Contact Information

Throughout the course participants will be communicating with the instructor and their classmates on a regular basis using asynchronous discussion forums. Students are provided with instructor contact information in the event they want to make email or phone contact. In addition, students are encouraged to email or phone the instructor at any time. Students will also receive feedback on the required assignments as they are submitted.

Forums

Participation is an important expectation of this course and all online courses. Online discussions promote reflection and analysis while allowing students to appreciate and evaluate positions that others express. While students may not be engaging with the same students throughout this course, they will be expected to offer comments, questions, and replies to the discussion question whenever possible. The faculty role in the discussion forum is that of an observer and facilitator.

Coursework Hours

Based on the Carnegie Unit standard, a unit of graduate credit measures academic credit based on the number of hours the student is engaged in learning. This includes all time spent on the course: reading the textbook, watching videos, listening to audio lessons, researching topics, writing papers, creating projects, developing lesson plans, posting to discussion boards, etc. Coursework offered for FPU Continuing Education graduate credit adheres to 45 hours per semester unit for the 900-level courses. Therefore, a student will spend approximately 135 hours on a typical 3-unit course.
