

# EDUC-943: The Mindful School

## Independent Study Online Course Syllabus

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### Course Description

Mindfulness is a practice increasingly making its way into schools. Mindfulness can be defined as “the awareness that arises through paying attention, on purpose, in the present moment, non-judgmentally” (Dr. Jon Kabat-Zinn). Cultivating mindful awareness through exercises of attention, noticing, and compassion has been shown to rewire our brains in ways that make us happier, calmer, and energized. Students who practice mindfulness are better able to regulate emotions, helping them contribute to a more positive and productive classroom experience.

Educators, mental health workers, and school leaders who enroll in this fully online graduate-level course will become equipped to establish and strengthen mindfulness programs in their schools. Participants will explore a variety of current school mindfulness and compassion-based programs that outline:

- frameworks and guidelines for school mindfulness
- dispositions of mindful educators
- fundamental mindfulness practices
- options for mindfulness-based curricula and programs
- roles and responsibilities of stakeholders
- strategies for increasing engagement and developing leadership
- suggestions for school-family partnerships

Whether you’re hoping to start a mindfulness club or aiming for a schoolwide implementation, this course will prepare you to launch a successful mindfulness program.

The course explores a secular, research-based approach to mindfulness. However, initial readings situate mindfulness in the context of Christian spirituality and theology. My hope is that you will find the course and associated activities inclusive and accessible to extend the benefits of mindfulness to all students and educators.

Course content draws on the CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning) Framework for the following competencies:

- self-awareness
- self-management
- responsible decision making
- social awareness
- relationship skills

The course may be taken with or without students.

### **Grading Policies**

- Assignments will be graded per criteria presented in the course rubrics.
- A = 90-100% and B = 80-89%, (anything below 80% will not receive credit.)
- The discernment between an A or a B letter grade is at the discretion of the instructor based on the quality of work submitted (see course rubrics).
- Coursework falling below a B grade will be returned with further instructions.
- All assignments must be completed to receive a grade and are expected to reflect the quality that teacher-training institutions require of professional educators. If completed assignments do not meet this standard, students will be notified with further instructions from the instructor.

## Writing Requirements

- **Sub-standard:** Writing contains noticeable mistakes in grammar and spelling. Does not address all parts of the writing task. Lacks a consistent point of view and organizational structure. May include marginally relevant facts, details, and explanations.

## Lesson Plan Requirements

- **Superior:** Instructional goals and objectives clearly stated. Instructional strategies appropriate for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is clearly delineated and authentic. All materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson clearly listed.
- **Standard:** Instructional goals and objectives are stated but are not easy to understand. Some instructional strategies are appropriate for learning outcome(s). Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is present. Most materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are listed.
- **Sub-standard:** Instructional goals and objectives are not stated. Learners cannot tell what is expected of them. Instructional strategies are missing or strategies used are inappropriate. Method for assessing student learning and evaluating instruction is missing. Materials necessary for student and teacher to complete lesson are missing.

## Instructor/Student Contact Information

Throughout the course participants will be communicating with the instructor and their classmates on a regular basis using asynchronous posting forums. Students are provided with instructor contact information in the event they want to make email or phone contact. In addition, students are encouraged to email or phone the instructor at any time. Students will also receive feedback on the required assignments as they are submitted.

## Forums

Participation is an important expectation of this course and all online courses. Online forums promote reflection and analysis while allowing students to appreciate and evaluate positions that others express. Forum postings are open to be viewed by all students in the course, so do not post sensitive or personal information about your students. While students may not be engaging with the same students throughout this course, they will be expected to offer comments, questions, and replies to the forum questions whenever possible. The faculty role in the forums is that of an observer and facilitator.

## Coursework Hours

Based on the Carnegie Unit standard, a unit of graduate credit measures academic credit based on the number of hours the student is engaged in learning. This includes all time spent on the course: reading the textbook, watching videos, listening to audio lessons, researching topics, writing papers, creating projects, developing lesson plans, posting to discussion boards, etc. Coursework offered for FPU Continuing Education graduate credit adheres to 45 hours per semester unit for the 900-level courses. Therefore, a student will spend approximately 135 hours on a typical 3-unit course.
